This main thoroughfare through the Coachella Valley is crucial for many reasons.

It has been at least 10 to 12 years since some places in this stretch have undergone rehabilitation and repavement and more than 16 years in other parts. The estimated cost to the city to rebuild the roadway through the two miles of Highway 111 is \$8 million.
